Solid Fuel Stoves - Summary of things you need to know!

Air pollution arises from a number of sources and solid fuel stoves contribute to this pollution, but much of it is unnecessary and can be avoided.

Any stove installed in a Smoke Control Area (smokeless zones) must legally be an 'exempted appliance'.

Exempt appliances apply to DEFRA jurisdiction in England.

Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland have a similar process, but local requirements may vary.

Details of exempted appliances can be found at <https://smokecontrol.defra.gov.uk> and are listed by area.

Steps to 'Getting it Right'

- Use wood with the correct moisture content (20% or less)
- Starting the fire
- Burn the solid fuel at the correct temperature
- Set the stove air controls correctly

This will avoid operating problems

- Unnecessary pollution
- Wasted fuel (and money)
- Soot/tar deposits - can cause chimney fire or dangerous blockage
- Stoves and chimneys have a reduced life.

Smoke coming out of the chimney – adjust the air controls

A local Chimney Sweep or stove installer can help to 'Get it Right'. Sweeps can advise on log storage and local contacts for good quality dry fuel.
